Please allow the Water Protectors to be represented by the attorney of their choice in the cases concerning Water Protectors versus Dakota Access Pipeline LLC, Energy Transfer Partners and the State of North Dakota. Citizens are allowed due process and a consideration of their plea in a timely manner. Making defendants wait for the few local attorneys who might represent them fairly would delay timely review of their case and/or subject the defendant to a biased attorney and/or court.
