I am highly in favor of allowing the defendants, known as water protectors, to have out-of-state attorneys represent them. There are five points I will address.

First, this should be most favorable for North Dakota, it will be less of a financial burden on the state and its Judicial system. The attorneys will bill their clients directly or *pro bono*, not to the state's public defenders. Second, it would alleviate the burden on the public defenders who can't handle the number of cases as it is now. Which if the defendants go to trial without adequate "assistance of council" violates their sixth amendment rights. If they go to trial without adequate council, it also violates the fourteenth amendment of "equal protection under the law".

Third, having attorneys from out of state would speed up the process and allow them to have their rights under the sixth amendment; "right to a speedy trial... and the right to the assistance of council".

Fourth, under the fourteenth amendment not only the Federal government but States are bound by the Constitution "nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws." Forcing the defendants to use only the attorneys in North Dakota violates the fourteenth amendment.

Fifth, exhibit one through three show the number and type of charges filed against the defendants; it also listed their attorney. It indicates at the time of the compilation of the data there were ninety persons with Felony class C charges against them with no attorney assigned, furthermore these defendants listed court appearances scheduled in December 2016. As I'm sure you know Felonies class C charges can carry up to five years in prison, if not longer. If these people have no "assistance of council" this is a serious breach of their rights. If they had no help in filling out the forms or in navigating the judicial system and were rejected council on that basis; this is also a serious and egregious breach of their constitutional rights in the sixth, ninth, and fourteenth amendment. How can we as a Nation justify locking up people for years when we did not give them every benefit of their rights under our Constitution that we are all protected by?

Conclusion, these five points show good reason, for both North Dakota and the defendants, why the attorneys, who are willing to work with the defendants now, from out of state should be allowed to help. If not, I'm sad to say, it will just show the world once gain prejudiced view that North Dakota, specifically Morton County has against the water protectors, and will do nothing to de-escalate the tension that has grown in the area. It will highlight for the World to see, how indigenous people and their rights to protect their water and their sacred sites are still being trampled on in the twenty-first century.
